




BOOKS


Hopscotch by Julio Cortázar

Julio Cortázar was one of the founders of the Latin American Boom and considered among the most innovative and original authors of his time. Hopscotch is a stream-of-consciousness novel with multiple endings, and it was Cortázar's masterpiece. Intended as a reflection on the lifelong search for truth, the story is told through the adventures of Horacio Oliveira, an Argentinian writer who lives in Paris with his mistress and bohemian friends before a tragic death leads him back to Argentina.



The Aleph by Jorge Luis Borges

The Aleph is a point in space from which all other points in the universe can be seen. A concept imagined and brought to life by Jorge Luis Borges, The Aleph is a method for exploring infinity and arguing that experience shapes perceptions, time is inescapable, and the universe is indefinable. Published in 1945, this short story is thought to be Paragas' magnum opus.



The Seven Madmen by Roberto Arlt

When Remo Erdosain is cauaht embezzling money from his employer, he loses his job, his wife leaves him, and he finds himself wandering the frenzied of 1920's Buenos Aires streets questioning the integrity of his mind and soul. Eventually finding himself among a group of revolutionaries, this portrait of Buenos Aires at a time when it was thought to be destined for greatness prophesizes the cycle of conflict that would haunt Argentina throughout the 20th century.





MOVIES

The Secret in Their Eyes (2009)

Based on the novel The Question in Their Eyes by Eduardo Sacheri, this film depicts a legal counsellor and his boss as they investigate a rape and murder case while also following their lives 25 years later, with the case as unresolved as the romance between the two. Winner of the Award for Best Foreign Film at the 82nd Academy Awards and the second highest-grossing film in Argentine history at the time of its release, The Secret in Their Eyes was recently ranked No. 91 on the BBC's 100 Greatest Films of the 21st Century.




Rebellion in Patagonia (1974)

One of the best Argentinian films of all time, Rebellion in Patagonia is based on Osvaldo Bayer's renowned novel The Avengers of Tragic Patagonia. It portrays the military suppression of anarchist and socialist workers in the Santa Cruz province of Patagonia in the 1920s, who made a strike to demand better working conditions.



A Place in the World (1992)

In remote Argentina, Mario, his wife Ana, and a geologist named Hans, fight to stop the building of a dam that will flood their valley and end the livelihoods of many locals. Set at a time when Argentina was returning to democracy, the strong cast of characters passionately argue about politics, human rights, and religion. Winner of numerous international and national awards, A Place in the World is a coming-ofage story that was also nominated for the Academy Award for Best International Feature Film.








Buenos Aires








Don Julio 2




Foundational Area Museum


La Aripuca





Displaying archeological objects associated with the ceremonies of the first inhabitants of the high peaks of the Andes, the Alta Montaña Archeology Museum is a space for conservation, research, and dissemination of the ancient cultural heritage of the Salta region. The main collection, the Llullaillaco Collection, consists of a burial trousseau and three children, who were offered to the Gods in an Incan ceremony known as Capacocha. This and the two other permanent exhibits, the Reina del Cerro Collection and Teruel Collection, can be explored via guided tours and special activities held throughout the year.



Salta City Natural Park Reserve

Just 20 minutes from the Plaza 9 de Julio, the Salta City Natural Reserve gives visitors a chance to immerse in the natural landscape of subtropical mountain forests. 


Pizarro National Reserve




Chorillo del Salto

Trekkers, day-hikers, and eco-tourists can also enjoy the mountain from several walking paths that run along its base.

Plaza de Mulas

Only those brave souls looking to climb Aconcagua and the surrounding towering peaks will set their sights on Plaza de Mulas. It takes two days to reach this central base camp of Aconcagua Park, where mountaineers, park rangers, rescue patrol, and medical corps set up their tents and work out logistics at 4,260 meters above sea level.

Cerro Aconcagua Viewpoint

Those unable or uninterested in attempting the summit of the highest peak on the continent can still get an illustrious view from the Mirador Cerro Aconcagua. Located just inside the Provincial Park at the edge of Los Horcones lagoon, visitors are treated to breathtaking panoramic scenery, at the center of which is the infamous snow-capped sentinel.
